

THE ACTORS



Some of her favorite roles have been Mother Superior in Nunsense, Bubbie in *Crossing Delancy*, Gertie in *Fuddy Meers* and Mary in *Waiting for Seven*. Her first experience with 8 Tens @ 8 was directing in 1999. 




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Could the next great short play **be from you?**

Barbara Anderson – The Tree

When Barbara retired, she began writing and long-distance walking. Her book on walking, Letters from the Way, was published in 2015. Her many short plays and monologues have been produced throughout the U.S., Britain, on-line podcasts and streamed productions. Her full-length play *Fugitive Colors* was a finalist in Ashland, selected for Play4Keeps, and produced in NYC January 2022. Her Zoom play *Life Under the Prairie* won best play, script, director and Zoom-set in NYC. *The Tree* was written as an emotional response to a choral concert focused on nature. During the pandemic, she developed a YouTube channel of short zoom plays at barbaraanderson.org. She is thrilled to be produced by Actors' Theater.

Lindsey often favours comedy in her writing, believing that when we laugh, we are most open to learn. It's also more fun to write! Her plays contain strong roles for women that like to challenge those themes that are universal to us all.

Stephen Cooper – Honest "Abe" Mazulu & Confessions à Deux

Stephen was a University Professor (University of Michigan Medical School) before turning to playwriting upon retirement. His short play *Confessions à Deux* was the First Prize winner in the Theatre Odyssey 2012 Short Play Festival and was produced in London to excellent reviews. He had a one-week residency at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival's Southern Writers' Project to work on his full-length play, *Spiritual Bliss. Spiritual Bliss* was one of five finalists (out of 1500 submissions) in the Julie Harris New Play Competition. He has had many plays produced all over the world, and is a member of the Dramatists Guild and the Sarasota Area Playwrights Society

Amy Dellagriarino – The Most Precious Thing

Amy is an award-winning playwright and screenwriter whose work has been produced across the country. Her play From the Perspective of a Canoe won the Playwriting Script Competition at the 2021 Austin Film Festival. Her play The Value of Moscow was nominated for a 2019 Stage Raw Award for Best Playwriting and was published through Stage Rights. Her comedy feature film Freelancers Anonymous won the 2018 NCGLFF Audience Award for Best Women's Feature, was a recipient of the Frameline Completion Fund Award, and earned the Reframe Stamp for gender-balanced media along with such films as The Favourite, Can You Ever Forgive Me, and Crazy Rich Asians. Her short plays have garnered the Best Comedy award in various festivals. She has participated in developmental readings of several of her plays with noted LA theatre companies such as Sacred Fools, Theatre of Note, Rogue Machine, and The Blank Theatre Company, and was a 2020 participant of Moving Arts Theatre's MADLab Play Development Series. She was a participant of the 2021 Kennedy Center Summer Playwrights Intensive as well as the resident playwright with Dark Horse Theatre Company in Virginia, and a founding member of Walking Shadow Readers Theatre, which focuses on new playwrights and new play development. She earned her BFA from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts.

Steven Haworth - Something Holy in Croatia

Steven was Writer-in-Residence at the 2018 Seven Devils Playwrights Conference working on his play *Monkey in the Shade*, which was also included in the PlayLab Series at The Great Plains Theatre Conference 2019. He wrote *Fernando* which opened the Obie Award-winning Ice Factory Festival 2017 at the New Ohio Theatre (New York), was also a winner of the Ashland New Play Festival, the First Look Festival in Los Angeles, and is published by Next Stage Press. *Four New Years in* Japan won the Jury Prize in the Think Fast Festival in March 2019 and is published in Applause Publications Best Ten-Minute Plays of 2020. He was commissioned to write [home] or The Quest for the Lost Tablet of Ur for Zoo District in Los Angeles that received five LA Weekly, a Garland, and Ovation award nominations. Steven was also commissioned to freely adapt Mikail Bulgakov's *Flight* for the Open Fist Theatre. In New York, Little Fishes was produced off-Broadway by Abingdon Theatre, Dark Age by Project III Ensemble Theatre, and The White Cave by Jesco Productions. *Time and Tony Oliva*, commissioned for the Seventh Inning Stretch at Mile Square Theatre, appears in the Best Ten-Minute Plays of 2017/18 published by Smith & Kraus. In New Zealand he was one of four playwrights contributing to The Big Kahuna Project directed by Christine Sang. *Blue/Whitney* was a winner of Stage Left Theatre's 10th Leapfest New Play Festival in Chicago. Steven was a founding member and Associate Artistic Director of the Project III Ensemble Theatre in residence at the Ohio Theatre, Soho, NYC, where he wrote *Dark Age*, directed *The Grand Ceremonial*, and performed in many productions. As an actor he has performed in New York, Los Angeles, and regional theatre, and did voice work on two documentaries, *The Millionaires Unit*, and *The Lafayette Escadrille*. He holds an MFA in playwriting from Carnegie Mellon University.


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
